It is truly heartbreaking to hear the news that the war between Israel and Palestine has not stopped, and many people are injured and dying. From the Israeli (Jewish) side, it is important to build and defend the country that has been their long-cherished dream for 2000 years, ever since they were driven out of their country by the Roman Empire. In addition, this time, Hamas, on the Palestinian side, launched the war first using terrorist attacks. On the other hand, the Palestinian side has been suffering from the British triple-talk diplomacy, which has deprived them of the Palestinian land they had settled for a long time and forced them into what is said to be a prison with no ceiling, as well as economic oppression for many years. From a military point of view, the Palestinian side is overwhelmingly at a disadvantage. They have been thoroughly beaten, both in terms of missiles and ground fighting and it is the Palestinians who have suffered many deaths. Both sides have their own arguments, and the situation remains untenable, but we hope that peace will return soon.

Now, at the call of the World YMCA, the Japan YMCA Alliance is also raising funds for Palestinian emergency relief. 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to whomsoever He wills. Peace on earth to whom He wills." That is what we hope for.

### 30<sup>th</sup> Asia-Pacific Area Convention (Hong Kong)

The Y's Men's Clubs International 30th Asia-Pacific Area Convention was held in Hong Kong from 3rd to 5th November 2023. Around 360 participants got to know each other in the first physical area convention in four years. As Keiko Tonegawa is the President of the Asia-Pacific Area this time, five members from Kawagoe Y's Men's Club, Taro Tonegawa, Kimiyo Yoshida, Miki Oikawa, and Goshiro Yamamoto, as well as Keiko Tonegawa's sister and her husband (Hisayo and Kenji Arai) also participated.

The first day of the convention started at 17:30, so we boarded a bus from the hotel at 16:00 and headed for the venue, but there was some hustle and bustle as the guide dropped us off at the wrong place. The opening ceremony started with a banner ceremony, followed by the Y's song. What felt a little strange was that the Chinese national anthem was sung at one point. Anyway, the banquet was very exciting as a post-Corona convention, with fun performances such as Chinese lion dance, kung fu, and Bian Lian.

On the second day of the convention, the excursions were divided into three courses, and I took part in Course A, the Lantau Island tour. We first went to a fishing village called Tai O, where we visited a place that still retains an atmosphere of traditional life, made sweets, and had lunch. We then visited the Great Buddha of Tiantan and returned to our hotel. The Great Buddha of Tian Dan is a giant at 34 meters high, but it looked much bigger because the Buddha itself is built on an elevated platform at the top of a staircase with 268 steps. And so, it was to the dinner on the second day of the convention, and as the second day's dinner was a culture night, I attended in kimono. Each region had its own entertainment on the day, with the Japan East region performing a lion dance by Mr. Suzuki of the Tokyo Koto Club and everyone singing a song together. I was impressed by the direction taken by the Japan West region, who performed a parody of Sumo wrestling to get laughs. At the end of the day, everyone danced to the "YMCA."

On the convention's third day, the location was moved to the Hong Kong Chinese YMCA Kowloon Centre for worship, followed by a program in the gymnasium. The Kawagoe Club, and Tokorozawa Club conducted the IBC signing ceremony with the Pangasinan Club in the Philippines. The fun three days ended with an appeal for the next Asia-Pacific Area Convention to be held in Kumamoto in 2025, followed by the closing ceremony.

There are many other things to do, but hopefully we will have a debriefing session.

The 30th Asia-Pacific Area Convention was held in Hong Kong from Friday, November 3rd to Saturday, November 5<sup>th</sup>. I had already held the position of Asia-Pacific Area President since July 1<sup>st</sup>, but I was officially installed in front of the members at the convention. The ceremony was presided over by International President-Elect Charming Shen. Together with Asia-Pacific Area President-Elect Joan Wong, we expressed our determination to take on this important responsibility. (Photo 1)

The convention was attended by Kawagoe Club President Goshiro Yamamoto, Yoshida Kimiyo Y's and Miki Oikawa Y's whom they gave us a boost. In addition to my husband, Taro Tonegawa, who witnessed the ceremony, my sister, and her husband (Hisayo and Kenji Arai) were also at the venue to watch over us, making this a memorable convention. Photo 2 shows me wearing my mother's hand-me-down kimono that I wore with the help of my sister, as I advocate ethnic dress as much as possible at the culture night banquet on the second day. It's not as good as President Yamamoto's well-established kimono (?). I am grateful to my sister for her support. (Photo 2)

This Convention was the first time in four years that members and stakeholders from the Asia Pacific Area had the opportunity to meet in person, as face-to-face meetings had only been possible just now due to the coronavirus disaster. Three hundred sixty (360) people attended, 185 from overseas and 175 from Hong Kong. There were 52 participants from the Japan East Region and 31 from the Japan West Region, bringing the total number of Japanese participants to 83. I cannot thank them enough. We also had participants from the Asia Pacific Area, South Korea, India, Africa (Kenya) and the US region, making it a convention with a rich international flavor.

Another important program was the Triangle IBC signing ceremony between the Pangasinan Y's Men's Club and the Tokorozawa-Kawagoe Clubs. At

the same time, the IBC signing ceremony between Sendai Aobajo Club and Lumbini Club (Nepal) was also held, adding to the convention's success. In the future, it will be essential to consider collaborative projects with Tokorozawa-Kawagoe Clubs and Pangasinan Club. We hope that our wisdom and manpower will advance international goodwill and contribution. (Photo 3)

Furthermore, I would like to inform you that Mr. Chou Wing Ping (Hong Kong Club), who came to Kawagoe 25 years ago as the +89/\* President when the Kawagoe Club was established and held its Charter Night, is still alive and was present during the three days of the Convention. When we told him that the Kawagoe Club was celebrating its 25th anniversary, he said he would love to visit us again. (Photo 4)

Other convention programs included the appointment of the Asia-Pacific Area Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Area Service Directors for the same, area reports, YMI reports, AYC reports and excursions.

The next Asia-Pacific Area Convention will be held in Kumamoto in August 2025, with the AYC taking place simultaneously. We will now look forward to the DBC exchange with the Kitakyushu Club and the IBC exchange with the Pangasinan Club.
