

We welcomed Ms. Akiko Kimoto as our table talker. who spoke on the topic of "Thinking about Non -attendance at School." Ms. Kimoto talked about how her eldest son (now 19 years old) stopped going to school from the second grade of elementary school, which triggered her to think about not attending school in various ways, and through trial and error, she established the "Kawagoe Parents

Association of Non-attendance School Children," a meeting place for parents with children who have stopped attending school, and "Rubato," a meeting where everyone can think about various aspects of not attending school children. She then explained what she had compiled in her own way about not attending school situations, which she summarized in her materials. Originally, the YMCA is an organization with youth development as its goal, and the Kawagoe and Tokorozawa clubs are also clubs with many former schoolteachers, so I was interested in this issue. Listening to Ms. Kimoto's talk this time. I felt as if I had been given a hint to think about the state of being out of school for these children and how the YMCA and Y's Men's Clubs should deal with this problem.

I think the illustration below of not attending school situations illustrates this very well. Especially in the truancy issue, I realized that it is not "whether the child goes to school or not," but "whether the child is in a good state or not" that really matters. That is why it was no wonder that in the illustration truancy, children who are going to school but are in a bad state, or in place C, are not forced to continue going to school but rather to evacuate to place D, which is not going to school, and from there to place B, which is not going to school but in a good state.

In any case, we do not know what causes truancy, which can happen to anyone. Truancy is not only a significant social loss, but it is also crucial for each of these children to have a good situation and a place of their own. I want to continue listening to the talk and would like to have other Y's Men's Clubs to talk about it in the future.

<u>Participating 2023-24 Japan East Region 27th</u> Japan East Regional Convention

On June 1, we participated in the 27th Japan East Regional Convention held at Tokachi Plaza and Hotel Nikko Northland Obihiro in Obihiro City, Hokkaido.

We were very much looking forward to this convention because it was held in the vast Tokachi Plain, which is called Japan's food supply base, amidst the magnificent nature of Hokkaido. More than 320 Y's Men from all over Japan gathered to renew old friendship and have pleasant communication, and it turned out to be an enjoyable and delicious convention that far exceeded our expectations.

From Kawagoe Club, two members, Keiko and Taro Tonegawa participated. Sixty-four people from the Japan West Region also participated, making for a very lively convention. We participated in the event from the eve of the festival, and the fairly spacious Mexican restaurant was filled to capacity even though it was rented out, so we could meet and greet many people before the main event.

The potato snacks sold at the Kawagoe Club booth were so popular with everyone that they were sold out before the opening of the convention. The convention opened at Tokachi Plaza with a marching band from Obihiro Otani High School and rhythmic dancing by children from the Tokachi Obihiro YMCA. This was followed by a banner ceremony and the opening ceremony. In the Japan East Region Hour I, there were reports from the Board of Directors and the YMCA. The YMCA report reported the YMCA's activities in the Noto Peninsula earthquake, showing how the YMCA played a significant role at the government's request and the great support of the Y's Men's Club. The commemorative lecture was given by Mr. Atsushi Nishimura, an Antarctic chef, author, and leader of Aurora Kitchen, who spoke about his experiences as a member of the Antarctic expedition in 1989 (Expedition 30) and 1997 (Expedition 38), as well as about the various ways of communication through food under the harsh conditions of these experiences. It was a fast-paced one and a half hour talk.

In the Japan East Region Hour II, following the service directors' reports, awards were presented. The Kawagoe Club was given two awards, the first of which was the IBC Award, and was asked to remain on stage after receiving the award. The Kawagoe Club was named the "Best Club Award" at the end. The reason for the award was that "the Kawagoe Club was active in inviting a wide variety of people to its meetings and inviting other clubs to participate, and was proactive in publicizing its activities by frequently posting announcements and activities on Facebook. It is a pity that the president could not accept the award, as I believe that Mr. Yamamoto, the club president, did a great job, but I received the award instead. Afterwards, the installation ceremony of Regional Director was conducted by Ms. Keiko Tonegawa, President of the Asia Pacific Area, and the officers were introduced to conclude the main program of the convention.

The venue was moved to the Hotel Nikko Northland Obihiro, where the Grand Dinner Party was held. Many people from the Japan West Region attended the party, and it was a great success, with many old friendships being renewed here and there. The food was sumptuous, including delicacies of the sea and the mountains, and the all-you-can-eat asparagus was especially popular, with a long line of people waiting to try it. We enjoyed the food of Hokkaido to the fullest. We parted, promising to meet again at the Japan West Regional Convention next week.

The Nagoya City Public Hall, located in "Tsurumai Park," one of the filming locations, is also a historic building and stately venue.

The Japan West Regional Convention was a great success with over 570 participants from all over Japan. Keiko and Taro Tonegawa attended from the Kawagoe Club.

Following the banner ceremony, the convention opened with an opening declaration by Japan West Regional Director, Satoshi Fukaya, followed by the annual report, District Governors' reports, and Service Directors' reports, and then awards were presented. The convention ended with the handover ceremony of Regional Directors and Regional officers.

The reception was held at the ANA Crowne Plaza Hotel Grand Court Nagoya. The country western band provided a lively performance, and everyone had a great time chatting with each other. The splendid dinner, which continued last week, has made me slightly concerned about my weight. Participating in the 50th Anniversary
Celebration of the Manila Downtown Y's
Menettes Club, the Philippines

One of the organizations of Y's Men International is the Y's Menettes Club. Article 3, Section 3 of the Y's Men International Constitution stipulates that "Y's Menettes clubs may be established in each club, area, district, region and at the international level, exclusively for women, which shall plan and carry out their own activities and projects in support of Y's Men's Clubs, YMCA and the community." It is stipulated that although often considered as a subordinate or annex organization of Y's Men's Clubs, Y's Menettes Clubs are independent women's organizations with the same objectives as Y's Men's Clubs and are partners of Y's Men's Clubs. Like Y's Men's Clubs, they are registered at the International Headquarters and pay a registration fee of 3 Swiss Francs per person.

There are clubs in Australia, Taiwan, and the Philippines in the Asia Pacific Area. Still, no clubs are registered as Y's Menettes clubs at the International Headquarters in the Japan East Region. However, we do make an annual donation as Y's Menett Contribution. The donation is used to support TOF projects voted by Y's Menett clubs around the world. The 2022-2024 support project is an educational and vocational training project for women in Nepal.

On a different note, on Saturday, May 17, the Manila Downtown Y's Menettes Club in the Philippines celebrated to commemorate the 50th anniversary of its establishment. The club now boasts 38 members, several charter members, and more than a dozen members who have served as president since the first president.

Aside from the commemorative celebration, I was particularly impressed to hear that this Y's Menettes club has continued its own service activities for many years, especially providing scholarships to 20 high school students yearly. Since many of the members have been successful in their projects, they can continue to do projects that require such a large amount of funds. Furthermore, in awarding scholarships, the club members interview the students and their parents to make decisions, rather than leaving it up to the schools to select the students.

Whether it is a Y's Men's Club or a Y's Menettes Club, a Y's Menettes Club is a group of people who want to serve their community, and it is an option to choose the proper organization for you. I would like to thank everyone in Manila Downtown for your service to the community and society over the past 50 years. I wish you all the best in your future endeavors.

Ms. Ozeki is like a big sister to me; she is about two years older than me, and I feel at ease with her. I was happy to see her face at many meetings.

She always bought a lot of goods at the Kawagoe sweet potato fund activities, and when I asked her if she was okay with such a large quantity, she replied, "I'm fine. She seemed to have divided them into small bags of 2 or 3 kg and sold them to her acquaintances. I really appreciate her warm consideration.

Ms. Ozeki's younger brother, Mr. Chiba, is also a music store owner and a piano tuner. Our piano is always tuned by her younger brother, Mr. Chiba.

According to him, Ms. Ozeki is the second oldest from the top of the siblings and is a very strong older sister. And their aunt is a pianist, so all the brothers learned to play the piano. Every New Year's Day, all the siblings have a piano recital. It seems that they spent their childhood like that. In one of her memorable stories, she told us that all her children were taught to play the pianica well, and the whole audience said enthusiastically, "Oh, yes!

Even though you cannot see her, she is firmly in everyone's heart. I am sure that I will find Ms. Ozeki at the meetings as well.

I will remember her as the big sister of the Y's Men's Club from time to time and continue to be active in the Y's Men's Club.
