Report on participation in the 36th Youth Volunteer Leaders Forum

I must begin with a sad report. Mr. Norihiro Shirota (Tokyo Tama Smile Club), the chairperson of the executive committee who dedicatedly spearheaded the 36th Youth Volunteer Leaders Forum, passed away suddenly on the second day of the forum. It is truly unfortunate, as I saw firsthand the meticulous planning and enthusiasm with which he worked from the preparatory stage. I sincerely pray for his soul to rest in peace.

The theme of this year's event is "Finding and Connecting for Us. Growing better." On Friday,

September 6, the forum's first day, Mr. Shintaro Ito of the Kumamoto YMCA gave a keynote speech entitled "Looking at social issues from the perspective of the 'Platform' program to support non-attending school children and students." After the keynote speech, the participating youth leaders had a group discussion, deepening each other's ideas.

We, Keiko Tonegawa and Taro Tonegawa, arrived at the Tokyo YMCA Lake Yamanaka Center at noon on Saturday, September 7, and joined the group for lunch. Upon arrival, we were greeted by Shintaro Kimoto, a participant from Kawagoe YMCA. He happily played dodgeball with other leaders and seemed to be having a great time.

After lunch, YMCA and Y's Men held a round-table discussion, in which Director Kohei Yamada reported on Y's International Association's Time of Fast project, for which TOF had awarded a grant for efforts to help children who have not been attending school in the Japan East Region. He also reported on the details of the project. A summary of the project is as follows:

The project duration is 36 months, from January 2025 to December 2027. Subsequent years will be planned within this period. The vision for the three years is "not to return to school only, but to create training and activities for work, with a view to individual future development, including vocational training, the arts, and skills acquisition. The first vear will focus on learning to understand non-attending school, including a series of three or four lectures (e.g., Tochigi YMCA lectures on November 16, December 21, and February 8 at Utsunomiya University; contact Utsunomiya YMCA for details). The provision of a place to stay will begin in the second half of the first year, and an operational structure will be established in the second and third years.

On the evening of the second day of the forum, a campfire was held under the leadership of Yamanakako Center staff. This was the first time I had experienced this kind of activity, so I felt it was very fresh. The youth leaders who participated in the campfire seemed to have a lot of experience and seemed to be having a lot of fun.

On the morning of the third and final day of the forum, the news of Mr. Shirota's death was announced to the youth leaders during the Holy Day service. It was the consideration of the organizing committee members and others involved to ensure that this forum, which Mr. Shirota had poured his heart and soul into, would be completed to the last minute.

During the group presentations by the youth leaders in the morning, it was very meaningful to hear how the leaders who participated in the forum have grown, and their honest hesitations, which are typical of young people. If you have a chance, why don't you join the Youth Volunteer Leaders Forum?

On September 21, the official election results were announced by the International Headquarters, and Mr. Edward Ong of Singapore was elected as the next International President for the 2024-2025 term. Edward's term as International President will begin on July 1, 2025 and end on June 30, 2026.

Incoming International President Edward Ong has served as General Manager of the Singapore YMCA and has been a Singapore Alpha Chapter Club member since 1980. He has been a member of the Singapore Alpha Chapter Club since 1980. During that time, he has served as President of the Asia Pacific Area in 2015-2016 and as Chairman of the 28th Asia Pacific Regional Convention Organizing Committee in Sendai, Japan, in 2019. (Editor's note)

I thought it had finally cooled off, but as early as October 9, Shumarinai in Hokkaido recorded below-freezing temperatures (according to a report). My nearly 80-year-old body cannot keep up with this sudden temperature change. I can't take it easy. How about you? Let's all keep our health first and spend our days in good health.

Last week, an old acquaintance, a Kumagaya City native who has lived in London for 28 years, and his wife stayed at our house. They are both over 70 years old and are concerned about their health. We talked about the National Health Service in the UK. They lamented that social welfare in the United Kingdom, which is said to be "cradle to grave," has begun to fray, and it is difficult to receive prompt and appropriate medical treatment. When my friend's wife had intestinal obstruction, she was unable to get anywhere through the usual home doctor, since their two children are doctors, so it was through their connections that she was able to survive. Among Japanese living in the U.K., it is not uncommon for people to return to Japan once to receive a state-of-the-art diagnosis, such as an MRI. It was a sobering story for me as I underwent the city's medical checkup for the current fiscal year last week.

Can we expect the new Prime Minister Ishiba to do the same? (KY)
